. Several later editions of the book have promoted it as "The most famous Science Fiction Novel ever written." It tells the story of Valentine Michael Smith returning to Earth in early adulthood after being raised by

Martians on the planet Mars <u>.</u> This is similar to an Independent Scientologist, having been immersed in the Church being exiled to live in the wog world. There is a feeling of total isolation which is enforced by the Church's practice of cutting ties between the Independent and his/her family, support group, and social circle.

The character demonstrates psychic (OT) abilities and superhuman intelligence coupled with a childlike naïveté (confront). These abilities cause fear and resentment in those who encounter them. This is not unlike what someone trained in Scientology may encounter from the average "man on the street". It is also the same fear and resentment that the same person may encounter from those still within the Church when confronted with the truth. One trying to apply KRC may find themselves utterly alone.
